Domestic Violence

Abuse of Women

One in every four women will at some time be in an abusive relationship. Yet this kind of crime is often kept a secret. Women stay with men who batter them for many reasons. Some reasons include money, fear, or inability to cope alone.

Types of Abuse:

Emotional

She may be:

- ▶ Bullied or threatened
- ▶ Not allowed to see family or friends
- ▶ Not allowed to have control of money
- ▶ Kept from working
- ▶ Made to feel bad about herself

Physical

She may be:

- ▶ Hit, slapped, or kicked
- ▶ Attacked with a weapon
- ▶ Forced to have sex or join in sex acts
- ▶ Pushed around, choked, or beaten up
- ▶ Not allowed to use birth control

There is a cycle of violence:

- ▶ **Stage 1:** Calm state: kindness, apologies, promises of no more violence
- ▶ **Stage 2:** Tension builds: name calling, blame, anger, shoving
- ▶ **Stage 3:** Battering phase: hitting, beating, sexual abuse, weapons used

With time, the calm stage gets shorter, and the violent stages get longer and more severe. The woman becomes lonely and scared.
